7.9.1 – Recycling and/or Zero Waste Plan

Standard: There shall be a recycling and/or zero waste plan for park and recreation facilities and administrative offices that is systematically monitored and periodically reviewed. The plan shall also include an educational component for both users and employees. The City of Coral Gables Community Recreation Department works in conjunction with the Public Works Sustainable Public Infrastructure Division to increase recycling within our city facilities and to provide alternative waste solutions with a focus on zero waste. See attached memo summarizing all the city's recycling and zero waste initiatives. (Page 2) Regular updates and public input are provided through the appointment of the Sustainability Advisory Board. See attached most recent board agenda with minutes. (Page 5)

One of the many initiatives that have been implemented is the centralized garbage can policy. Individual garbage cans were removed from offices and each facility is equipped with centralized garbage cans to dispose of food and other non-recyclables. Each office is equipped with recycling bins only. In addition, each facility was given a recycling flyer to be posted above all recycling bins to properly educate on what is and is not recyclable. See attached flyer. (Page 13) For electronic and hazardous waste, the city provides several annual event opportunities for the city and community members to safely dispose of any electronic and hazardous waste. See attached recycling drive-through numbers which includes pounds of waste collected at each of those events. (Page 14)

Another zero-waste initiative is that of the Christmas tree recycling program. Recycling a Christmas tree helps to preserve landfill space and provides the opportunity to repurpose this valuable resource as mulch and ground cover in parks and planting areas throughout the community. See attached report. (Page 15)

The City of Coral Gables continues to work within its own Departments as well as businesses within the City to promote an increase in recycling and zero waste through various ordinances such as the ban on plastic bags and expanded polystyrene at special events. See attached flyer. Additional public education efforts are disseminated through initiatives such as the Help Reduce Carbon Footprint campaign. See attached flyer. (Page 22)

The newest zero waste campaign launched in 2024 is the NexTrex Plastic Film Recycling Program, which focuses on providing community drop off locations in several of the city facilities in an effort to collect film and plastic bags and recycle and reuse them to manufacture composite decking and railings. Sustainability – Parking and Mobility Services

In pursuit of the City's goal to provide exceptional services that enhance local and global environmental quality, enrich our local economy, and strengthen the health and well-being of our community, the city has advanced several initiatives, including promoting increased recycling within our city facilities and throughout our community through the following initiatives:

- In 2012, the City established a centralized garbage can policy. Individual garbage cans were removed from offices and each facility is equipped with centralized garbage cans to dispose of food and other non-recyclables. Each office is equipped with recycling bins only. The City continues to implement this policy throughout all City facilities. Attached please see the updated City Facilities recycling flyer that includes the acceptable items for recycling. The flyers are posted in common areas/hallways/breakrooms etc. and above recycling bins for employees and visitors to see.
- Coral Gables was the first city in Florida to ban single use plastic bags in 2017. In addition, the city has also banned expanded polystyrene "Styrofoam" (2016) and prohibits single use plastic straws (2019). The City of Coral Gables is also encouraging local businesses to "Skip the Straw." The City continues to prohibit the use of single use plastic bags, plastic straws and stirrers and expanded polystyrene in City facilities (includes city buildings, Community Recreation, golf courses, and any other city property), by City contractors/vendors/concessionaires and by anyone who is issued a special event permit. Please see the attached educational flyer.
- Waste Management continues to service recycling in all our city facilities.
- The city coordinates with our contracted janitorial company, South Florida
 Maintenance, on proper recycling and reducing recycling contamination throughout all
 our city facilities/parks.
- The city has developed a virtual employee sustainability video training series that will be released soon to all City employees. One portion of the training is dedicated to educating employees on proper recycling methods.
- The city provides electronic waste services in all our city facilities through our

Information Technology Department. Our IT Department coordinates with our contracted electronic waste company E-Scrap to collect and recycle any old electronics. To date, we have recycled over 37,873 pounds of electronic waste from our city facilities.

- Information Technology also coordinates the recycling of Xerox printing cartridges which can be sent via Inter-office to the Public Works 72nd Ave Facility.
- The city provides metal recycling services at our Public Work Maintenance facility. Community Recreation and other City departments can drop off metal to be recycled at the back of our Public Works maintenance yard in the designated metal recycling bin.
- Any landscape waste generated at parks by our landscape division is taken to our Public Works facility and chipped and turned into mulch.
- The sanitation department has installed 20 trash bins/recycling bins in the City Right of Way near Ponce/City Hall as a part of a pilot project. The bins are installed caddy-corner to one another and include can slots openings. The city is using clear bags to help reduce contamination.
- Community Recreation began a pilot at William H. Kerdyk Jr. & Family Park (aka Riviera Park) in Feb. they currently have several recycling receptacles throughout the park and considered Kerdyk Park a good candidate because of its large size and different types of uses, both commercial and leisure traffic. They have also created a centralized recycling deposit location at the Granada Golf Course maintenance area giving the much-needed infrastructure for staff to deposit recycling moving forward. They hope that this experiment will prove fruitful over the next 6-8 months, they plan to monitor contamination and request additional funding in the budget for added receptacles in our larger parks.
- Since its inception in 2020, the City's Keep Coral Gables Beautiful Program (a local
 affiliate of the Keep America Beautiful Program) has diverted 213,575 pounds of
 household hazardous waste, 222,701 pounds of electronic waste, and collected 14,300
 pounds of clothing to be donated. In addition to that, the program has also recycled
 125,994 pounds of batteries.
- In May 2024 the Nextrex plastic bag and film recycling program was unveiled. The city
 will collect the materials in 3 locations then staff will drop them off at a local partner
 where they will be sent for recycling.
- In May 2022, the City of Coral Gables received a grant from the Florida Beverage
 Association to implement the Reverse Vending Machine Recycling Incentive Program,
 which would accept plastic water bottles and aluminum cans. Participants could make
 and account and get rewards for being the top recyclers each month. The machine was
 up from November 2022 to May 2024 and a total of 21,023 containers were recycled.
- Since 2016, the City of Coral Gables has partnered with Covanta Dade Renewable Energy
 to keep prescription drugs off the street and dispose them in an environmentally safe
 manner. The drop-off bin is in the lobby of the new Coral Gables Police and Fire
 Headquarters located at 2151 Salzedo Street. Individuals can drop off their expired or
 unwanted prescription drugs 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The pharmaceuticals
 collected will be incinerated for safe destruction. To date, the city has collected and
 safely destroyed over 1,759 pounds of prescription drugs.
- The Keep Coral Gables Beautiful also coordinates a Christmas Tree Recycling Program

- each year. This past holiday season the city collected over 7,794 Christmas trees for recycling. This generated roughly 389,700 pounds of mulch that will be used in our city parks and planting areas throughout the community. The Christmas Tree drop off location for our multi-family residents is located at our Coral Gables Youth Center in partnership with our Community Recreation Department.
- On Earth Day, April 2019, the city, in partnership with the Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce launched a Green Business Certification Program. The goal of the program is to educate, recognize and reward local businesses for all their amazing sustainability efforts including a focus on waste reduction and recycling. To date, the city has certified 8 local businesses. The city is working to update this certification program and launch the summer of 2024.

Meeting called to order at 5:15 P.M. by Teddy Lhoutellier.

MOTIONS:

February 28, 2024, Meeting Minutes – Martin motioned to approve the meeting minutes; Nicolas seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

PHYSICAL QUORUM (10): Teddy, Tiffany, Dipak, Gabi, Jasper, Anabella, Nicolas, Kartrina, Joe, and Martin

Quorum was met at 5:15 P.M.

Public Comment:

- i. Deter Manstein is interested in the meetings and has no comments during this meeting.
- *ii.* Irela Bague wanted to learn about the most recent updates on the city's sustainability initiatives.

Keep Coral Gables Beautiful Program Updates (KCGB):

- *i.* Recent Events:
 - 1. A Cleaner Planet Cleanup Friday, March 8
 - a. KCGB held a cleanup in partnership with A Cleaner Planet at Coral Gables Preparatory Academy and Philips Park. There were 61 volunteers and 65 pounds of debris collected.
 - 2. Coral Gables High School Tabling Event Thursday, March 14
 - a. KCGB staff went to Gables High School to participate in their tabling event to share with the students the different Earth Month events that are planned for April. There were 294 students at the tabling event.
 - 3. Gables Bike Tour Living with Water Saturday, March 17
 - a. Matt, Diego, and Jim Murley, County Office of Resilience, guided the 62 bike tour participants and presented on flooding, sea level rise, and saltwater intrusion. They visited the FIU buoy that collects water quality data, Ruth Bryan Owens Waterway Park and saw the waterway, and the Riviera Outfall.
 - 4. Farmers Market Sustainability Village Saturday, March 30
 - a. There were 120 participants that came out to the first ever Sustainability Village held during the last Farmers Market of the season. Nine local sustainability groups were present to educate the

visitors on what they specialize in. It was a great success and will become an annual event.

5. Spring Downtown Community Cleanup – Monday, April 1

a. 42 volunteers came out to the first Downtown Cleanup of the year and the kickoff to Earth Month. They collected 342 pounds of trash from the downtown area. After the cleanup portion of the event, KCGB staff had the volunteers tour the new interactive art installation, The Water Below Us, and went to Sweetgreen to enjoy some light bites.

6. The Water Below Us Ribbon Cutting – Wednesday, April 3

a. There were 80 participants who came to view the unveiling of the newest art installation on Giralda Plaza. This interactive art piece was in partnership with BLUE Missions. The art piece is meant to educate the public about the importance of the Everglades Watershed and Aquafers by using virtual reality.

7. 4th Annual Plogging at Matheson – Saturday, April 6

a. 41 participants came to the 4th annual plogging event at Matheson Hammock Park and removed 100 pounds of debris from the mangrove trails before the rainy season came in.

ii. Upcoming Events & Updates:

1. Pinewood Cemetery Invasive Plant Removal – Wednesday, April 10

a. This event will be the third invasive removal done at the historic Pinewood Cemetery. This event will be held during a teacher planning day during Earth Month.

2. Baynanza – Saturday, April 13

a. The 42nd annual Baynanza cleanup, hosted by Miami-Dade County's DERM, will be held at three Coral Gable's locations – <u>Chapman Field Park</u>, <u>Matheson Hammock Park</u>, and <u>R. Hardy Matheson Preserve at Bella Vista Point</u>.

3. Bi-Annual Recycling Drive-Thru – Sat, May 4th

a. The Recycling Drive-Thru event will be on May 4. This event will be taking place at City Hall and participants can bring household hazardous waste materials, paper shredding, old electronics, and clothing for Camillus House.

4. Commercial Beautification Awards – March & April

a. The Commercial Beautification Awards serve to recognize businesses that have gone above and beyond with the beautification and

maintenance of their storefronts and surrounding areas. Nominations are received from the Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce, Code Enforcement Division, Economic Development Department, and the Coral Gables community at large. Nominees must meet all nomination criteria and winners are selected by the SAB as the acting KCGB Board of Directors. Nominations end on April 31.

iii. Grant Updates

1. KAB Great American Cleanup

a. KCGB was awarded the Great American Cleanup grant. This grant is a cash grant that would allow KCGB to purchase essential supplies for the upcoming GAC season that will be from March 19 to June 20. The grant was for \$2,500. One hundred cleanup kits will be sent to continue KCGB's Litter Kit Program. With this grant, enough supplies, marketing materials, and native plants will be purchased for the many events planned throughout Spring.

Sustainability City Commission

i. <u>Discussion Regarding State Legislation Concerning Gas-Powered Leaf Blowers</u>

1. The State Senate just passed a one-year preemption/moratorium until July 2025, no municipality or city is allowed to ban gas powered leaf blowers. The city's residents and companies may continue to use gas powered leaf blowers if they choose to. It was attached to an appropriation of \$100,000 and is going to be used for a life cycle analysis of gas-powered blowers. The results will be published January 2025 and will be used as a recommendation for any future regulations.

Standing Agenda

i. Sea-Level Rise Update

1. Diego and Matt updated the Board on the city's plan to submit the second quarter report to Hazen, the consultant, who is assisting with the Resilient Florida Grant to update the Vulnerability Assessment. The U2 report will go to the state once it is finished. A third meeting is coming up to discuss data collection. Additional infrastructure has been added to the report. Once the report has been drafted, Matt plans on having Hazen come to a meeting and provide a comprehensive update on the latest data and report.

ii. Water Quality Update

Sustainability Advisory Board April 8, 2024

- 1. FIU is continuing to collect data and will have a report towards the end of the year. The data collected within that report is very valuable as it is used to apply for grants and as justification for the fact that this is important to the city. The data also acts as a roadmap on what needs to be done on land to help mitigate the nutrient levels seeping into the waterways.
- 2. Tiffany is interested in any septic-to-sewer updates. Matt stated that there is a grant that the city has received, and Public Works is working on this grant. The septic-to-sewer study and the Stormwater Master Plan is still being worked on and should be completed sometime next year. Both Stormwater Master Plant and Vulnerability Assessment are being worked on in tandem.

Member Comments

A. Teddy:

 Teddy updated the Board on the upcoming Earth Month events at UM. UM had an event this last Saturday and Vice Mayor Anderson attended. They planted mangroves on a 200-foot strip of canal in front of a small local business who sponsored the event.

B. Anabella:

i. The Green Business Certification Application was sent to Anabella because she is assisting in this program. She and Mark Trowbridge will be reviewing and providing input.

C. Nicolas:

- i. Interested in any Dashboard update, staff are working on getting the energy and water data through Energy Cap and will be finished around summertime. Once it is drafted, staff will share it with the Board.
- ii. Was interested in the small amount of electric charging stations found throughout the highway rest stops. A discussion took place on why this is affecting EV sales and companies are looking towards hydrogen cars.

D. Katrina:

i. Brought to the Board's attention a bill that was passed a few years ago by the State of Florida regarding the Biscayne Bay license plate for Miami-Dade County. All of the proceeds will be given to helping the Bay. Not many have been ordered yet, so the Miami Foundation will pay for the license plate orders and will be free to the public. This is not well publicized, so it is important to spread the word.

E. Martin:

i. Has been making progress on his project with the former City Manager and has a meeting with the new City Manager. Martin will report the progress in the next meeting.

F. Tiffany:

i. Likes the new meeting room but wants to know what will happen if there is a large number of people from the public interested in attending. Matt said that this meeting was a trial and will be meeting in a larger space for the next meeting.

These properties will have their trees collected during specified collection days (see schedule below). Multi-family properties will have the option of dropping their tree off at a specified drop-off area located at the War Memorial Youth Center's (405 University Drive) west parking lot (south end), parallel to Segovia Street. **All trees being recycled must have the following items removed: tree stand, lights, ornaments, tinsel and other decorations.**

- Tress must be placed out after 5:00 P.M. the day before the scheduled tree collection day specified above.
- Trees must be kept separate from the trash/yard waste pile. If the tree is placed in the trash pile with other debris, it won't be recycled.

Internal Procedures

Sanitation Division staff will collect trees from single-family homes as per the collection schedule citywide. Trees at the multi-family drop-off area will be collected once a week or as needed. Trees are taken to the Public Works Facility located at 2800 S.W. 72 Avenue, Miami, FL 33155.

Once at the Public Works Facility, the city's landscape contractor Superior will convert the trees to mulch. A handheld counter will be provided to the contract. This will be used to keep track of the number of trees that are recycled into mulch.

Logistics:

- Single-Family residences trees will be collected by either the clam truck or by extra collection crew if resident calls in with a request.
- Trees will be placed in the back of the Public Works Yard by the left (south) of the back gate (SW corner of the back gate (SW corner).



- City's tree trimming company, Superior, will chip trees after all the collection dates are completed. (Approx. 1-2 days to chip trees). If there is a large tree pile before collection completion, contractor may begin chipping beforehand when times allows. City is charged hourly rate to have trees chipped. Estimated cost: \$1,000-\$1,500.
- Trees will be counted prior to being chipped.
- Mulch will be used on City Parks/properties and at the Public Works nursery
- Trees left in the Youth Center Parking Lot will be collected once a week by sanitation staff.
 - Youth Center Staff can call any of the following sanitation coordinators if the Christmas Tree pile gets too large prior to the weekly pickup.



Lessons Learned

For future years, language on website stating single family home collection dates will be adjusted to include a clause. The clause will consist of language stating that tree collection might take place on to two days after scheduled date depending on crew availability.

Program Results

Total Trees Collected: 1,180

On average a six to seven foot Christmas trees weighs around 50 pounds. Taking that into account, we can estimate an average of 59,000 pounds of mulch was collected.

Savings In Tipping Fees:

This program resulted in savings between \$1,253.75 to \$2,138.75 in tipping fees depending on disposal location.

- Breakdown: Estimated 59,000 lb. \div 2,000 lb. = 29.5 tons
 - o 29.5 tons x \$72.50 fee per ton at County facility = \$2,138.75
 - o 29.5 tons x \$42.50 fee per ton at Waste Management facility = \$1,253.75



SINGLE USE PLASTIC BAGS/STRAWS/EXPANDED POLYSTYRENE ORDINANCES

The City of Coral Gables is a leader in sustainability efforts. The goal of these ordinances (Chapter 62 - Article VII, and Chapter 2 - Article VIII) is to eliminate **single-use plastic bags/straws/stirrers and expanded polystyrene** (Styrofoam) and replace them with more environmentally friendly alternatives in order to reduce waste, litter, and pollutants from ending up in landfills on streets, parks, public spaces and in waterways.

Who Does These Ordinances Apply To?

- City Facilities: Includes buildings, parks, city golf courses, or any other city owned property.
- City Vendors, Contractors, Concessionaires, and/or Operators.
- Special Event Permittees and their subcontractors which includes any person/entity issued a special event permit by the City for a special event on City property, in a City facility or in the City's right-of-way.

Exceptions

- Special events of 100 people or less (such as a birthday party or family reunion).
- Not-for-profit corporations, school district, and county/state/federal governmental entities.
- ADA requests.
- Pre-packaged food items and/or items used to store meat, pork, seafood or poultry.
- Exempt Bags: Produce bags, Prescription Medicine bags, Dry Cleaning bags, Door Hanger bags, Newspaper bags, Garbage bags, Pet Waste bags, Yard Waste bags; and bags brought in by the customer.

Sustainable Alternatives

- Reusable (Designed for Long-Term Use: Cloth, Glass, Metal, etc.) Bags, Bottles, Cups, and Mugs
- Compostable Bags: Must meet ASTM D6400 Standards or equivalent
- Paper Bags and Cups: Made from at least 40% Post-Consumer Recycled Material
- Metal, Bamboo, Paper, and Sugar Cane Straws/Stirrers

Enforcement/Penalties

- Compliance with ordinances is a special event permit condition of approval.
- Enforcement begins immediately. If violation is found, permittee will be asked to cease use.
- Failure to do so will subject permittee to revocation of the Special Event Permit.
- For City contractors, a violation is deemed a default under the contract.

CORAL GABLES ENCOURAGES BUSINESSES TO ELIMINATE SINGLE USE PLASTICS AND EXPANDED POLYSTYRENE

The City is strongly encouraging all local businesses to eliminate the use of single use plastics and expanded polystyrene (most commonly know as Styrofoam). Single use plastics and expanded polystyrene often are not readily recyclable. They take hundreds to thousands of years to degrade in the environment. According to studies, there will be more plastic than fish in the ocean by 2050. To help lead by example, the City has ceased purchasing single use plastic bags, straws and stirrers along with products made of expanded polystyrene.

Recommendations

- Conduct a supply chain audit.
- Work with suppliers on identifying sustainable alternatives.
- Reach out to other similar local businesses to learn how they switched.
- Market the switch to sustainable alternatives to your customers (website, social media, etc.).
- Do not automatically provide a single-use item to every customer. Make available upon request.
- Encourage use of reusable items: provide incentives for customers to bring their own.

Recognition Opportunities

The City of Coral Gables in collaboration with the Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce have developed a Green Business Certification Program. The goal is to recognize/reward our businesses for all their amazing eco-friendly efforts. AT HOME

• Change a Light: Replace frequently used incandescent light bulbs with LED Light bulbs.

30 LED light bulbs account for only 451 pounds of CO2 per year as opposed to 4500 pounds for 30 incandescent light bulbs.



- Use Less Hot Water Wash Only Full Loads in Your Washing Machine & Take Shorter Showers: The water heater is a large user of energy in most homes. About 90% of the energy used to wash clothes is from heating the water. Saves more than 100 lbs. of CO₂ per year.
- Adjust Your Thermostat: Cool your home at 78° or warmer with the thermostat fan set to "auto." Raise the temperature to 82° or warmer when you are away from home. It saves 2,000 lbs. of CO₂ per year.
- Clean Air Conditioning Filters: Clean your A/C filters monthly to save energy and money on cooling costs. It saves 350 lbs. of CO₂ per year.
- Purchase Energy Star® Appliances: Look for Energy Star® rated products in more than 40 categories, including televisions, refrigerators, dishwashers, and air conditioners.



- **Unplug Unused Electronics:** When electronic devices are turned off, but still plugged in, they continue to use energy (vampire power). It saves over 1,000 lbs. of CO₂ per year.
- Limit the Time You Run Your Pool Pump: In summer months, no more than six hours a day. In winter, no more than four hours a day.
- Avoid Using Multiple Refrigerators: If you have an extra refrigerator that is not kept full or is hardly used, turn it off or dispose of it properly.
- **Reduce Garbage:** Buy products with less packaging. Practice recycling (paper, plastic, cardboard and glass) and composting. It saves 1,000 lbs. of CO₂ per year.
- Take an Online Home Energy Survey: Visit FPL's website (www.fpl.com) to take a home energy survey and to receive a guide for an energy efficient home.
- Plant Native Drought-Resistant Plants: Xeriscape landscaping conserves water and protects the environment. Trees absorb and use carbon dioxide for energy and produce oxygen for us to breathe.

ON THE ROAD



- Inflate Your Tires: Keep the tires on your car properly inflated and check the pressure monthly.
- Change Your Car's Air Filter: Check your car's air filter monthly and change it when needed.
- **Give Your Car a Break:** Leave your car at home. Walk, bike, carpool, or use mass transit (such as the Coral Gables Trolley).



• **Drive a Fuel-Efficient Vehicle or Alternative Fuel Vehicle:** Getting a few extra miles per gallon makes a big difference. Saves thousands of pounds of CO₂ and a lot of money per year.

IN THE OFFICE & AT SCHOOL





- Shut down Computers at Night: Shut down or turn off computers, monitors, printers and speakers each night.
- Use Power Strips: Plug all electronics into power strips and turn them off each night to save more energy.



- Program Copy Machines: Have them enter sleep and shut-down modes after a selected time (set to Energy Saving Mode). Additionally, set copy machines to print double-sided by default.
- Purchase Green Products: Including green cleaners, fuel-efficient vehicles, and Energy Star® rated electronics and vending machines.
- Receive an Energy Audit: An Energy Audit will identify cost-beneficial improvements for your facility. FPL provides free on-site energy evaluations.
- **Conserve Water:** Check all faucets, water fountains, toilets, and urinals for leaks and running water.
